The 2022 Republican primary race for the 94th District of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives was a high-profile contest between incumbent Stan Saylor and Wendy Fink with Wendy winning.

The Township would like to thank Stan Saylor for all that he has done for Windsor Township during his twenty-nine years of service in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Stan has assisted the Township with securing grants as follows:

- more than \$6,000,000 for the construction of the Community Center;
- two (2) Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection grants for leaf trucks totaling \$307,000;
- a Community Development Block Grant for \$26,000 for the installation of ADA doors at the Township Office;
- a \$55,000 grant for the installation of a generator at the Township Office from the Pennsylvania Department of Economic Development;
- a \$30,000 grant to establish an Emergency Operation Center and provide radios for the Emergency Management personnel from the Pennsylvania Department of Economic Development; and
- \$141,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection for the rehabilitation of the Windsor Wonderland playground area at Freysville Park.

Again, the Township wants to say THANK YOU to Stan and wish him luck in his future adventures. We look forward to having this same kind of relationship with Wendy.

Update on Community Center

We had hoped that the design and land development plans for the community center would have been finalized, bids opened and construction underway. Some issues have come up in the form of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) requiring that a left turn lane be added on Lombard Rd. for traffic coming from the Cape Horn area. Also, we are still waiting for the permits from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PennDEP).

The community center complex will consist of a community center, two (2) pavilions which can be rented, soccer fields, basketball courts, a play area, tether ball, open space and a walking trail. Inside the community center will be a gymnasium, a multi-activity room with a

turf type flooring so that it can be used for batting cages, baseball/softball practices, soccer practices and other activities; social hall; kitchen area and staff offices. The building plans are available at the Township Office if you would like to see what is proposed.

As noted in the Message from the Windsor Township Board of Supervisors, Representative Stan Saylor has secured an additional \$3,000,000 in Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP) grant funds for the construction of the community center. This brings the total RACP funds to \$6,000,000. At the time that this newsletter is being published, Representative Saylor is pursuing additional funds for the community center.

Windsor Wonderland

Windsor Wonderland was constructed in the mid-1990s. As components of the play structure break, we are finding that the component cannot be replaced or retrofitted with a new piece.

Last year, the Township applied for a PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) grant to rehabilitate Windsor Wonderland by replacing the play structure, swings and picket fence as well as correcting the stormwater problem that makes the area unusable for several days after a large rainstorm. In late December 2021, a notice was received that a grant in the amount of \$141,000 was awarded to the Township.

We are hopeful that construction will begin later this year. Unfortunately, Windsor Wonderland will be closed during the four (4) to six (6) month construction period.

In an effort to return the pickets and bricks to the individuals who purchased them in honor of a loved one, the Township has scheduled two (2) dates/times that the pickets and bricks can be picked up. They are **Saturday, September 17, 2022,** from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and Tuesday, September 20, 2022, from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. If you purchased a picket or a brick and are not able to come to Freysville Park on either of these dates, please contact the Township Office at 717-244-3512 and we will make arrangements to get it to you. Any pickets or bricks remaining at the end of November will be disposed of.

Building Permits


Building Permits are required for most projects. Contact the Township Office at 717-244-3512 if you have a specific project upcoming. Some examples that require permits are additions, sheds, carports, new or replacement patios or decks, resurfacing or enlargement of driveways, fences and above ground, inground or temporary swimming pools.

LEAF COLLECTION

Leaf collection will run from October 17, 2022 through December 9, 2022. The Township uses a leaf collector that is self contained and is operated by one person. This eliminates the need for rakers. Remember to rake leaves as close to the edge of the blacktop/curb as possible in narrow rows away from fences, posts, poles or cars. Tree limbs, grass, shrubs and hedge trimmings, bricks, stones or any foreign objects are not to be deposited in the leaves. If foreign objects are found, the leaves will not be collected.

Windsor Township strives to process applications for permits as quickly as possible. It may take up to 15 business days to issue a Building Permit once it has been submitted. A completed application includes an entirely filled out application form and a plot plan for the entire lot identifying all existing and proposed improvements, including dimensions (length and width) on the lot (including house, driveway, sheds, patios, decks, sidewalks, etc). Depending on the project, additional information may be required for submission.

No work can be started until a Building Permit has been issued and the placard card has been placed in a location that can be seen from the street.




SPRING LEAF COLLECTION

The Township will hold a spring leaf collection program again next year. It will run from April 17, 2023 through April 28, 2023. All aspects of the fall collection will apply during the spring collection.

SHREDDING EVENT

The Township will again be sponsoring a shredding event. Due to the unavailability of a Saturday, it will be held on **Thursday, October 27, 2022 from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.** at the Township Office located at 1480 Windsor Rd., Red Lion. This event is a free event for Township residents only. **Photo identification is required.** NO BUSINESSES. There is a two (2) box limit. A box is defined as 18 inches long/9 inches high/12 inches wide.



COMPACT FLUORESCENT LIGHT (CFL) BULB RECYCLING

Just a reminder that CFL bulbs can still be brought to the Township Office for recycling. Bring your unbroken CFLs to the Township Office during normal business hours and we will take it from there. Sorry, we cannot accept tube fluorescent bulbs. This is only for CFL bulbs.

Garbage and Large Item Collection

Just a reminder that there is a four (4) bag/container limit on your weekly trash service. Each bag/container, when filled, may not weigh more than 75 lbs. nor exceed a volume of 32 gallons. If you are using a toter supplied by Republic Services, the toter is considered 3 bags of garbage. Therefore, you can put out a toter plus one (1) bag of garbage.

A frequently asked question is what to do with paint cans. If there is paint in the can, add some sawdust or kitty litter to absorb the paint. Once that has been done, it can be put out with your regular trash.

Residents are permitted to put out **one (1) large item per week** as part of their regular trash collection. All items must be out at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on your regular trash collection day. It is suggested that items be placed at the curb the night before your collection day. **Please contact the Township Office at 717-244-3512 by 4:00 p.m. the day before your collection to inform us you will be putting a large item at the curb.**

- Hazardous materials (Pesticides, propane tanks, etc.)
- · Tree stumps and other woody waste
- Electronics

When there is a holiday on a weekday, collection will be one day late after the holiday. The holidays observed by Republic Services are:

- New Years Day
- Memorial Day
- July 4th (if it is a weekday)
- Labor Day
- Thanksgiving
- Christmas Day

For example:

Thanksgiving Day is a Thursday. Therefore, the regular Thursday collection will take place on Friday and the regular Friday collection will take place on Saturday.

REMEMBER: Due to the "Covered Devices Act", electronics will not be collected as part of our trash/large item collection program. They cannot be disposed of at Pennsylvania waste disposal facilities. They must be recycled through an approved recycler or recycling program. Please see the article in this newsletter on electronics recycling.

PAINTING OF FIRE HYDRANTS

Chris Fife of Red Lion approached the Township expressing his desire to volunteer for any community service activity that the Township had available. It was decided that he would paint twelve (12) fire hydrants along Lombard Rd., Cape Horn Rd. and Kendale Rd. Thank you for reaching out to the Township!

Woody Waste Drop-off and Curbside Collection

The Township is still offering a drop off location for woody waste. The woody waste drop off will take place the 2nd Saturday of selected months from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Public Works Building located at 970 White Oak Rd., Windsor. The drop off dates for the rest of 2022 and all of 2023 are as follows:

October 8, 2022 December 10, 2022 March 11, 2023 April 15, 2023 (NOTE: 3rd Saturday due to Easter Holiday) June 10, 2023 July 8, 2023 August 12, 2023 September 9, 2023 October 14, 2023 December 9, 2023

The drop off is for residential woody waste only. Our employees will be on hand to assist with unloading the woody waste. **This service is available to Township residents only. Photo identification will be required.** There is a six (6) ft. length limit as well as a six (6) inch diameter limit. Woody waste brought to the drop off location does not need to be bundled. NO commercial businesses. NO grass clippings, tree stumps, sawdust, mulch, flower debris or bagged debris.

The Township will continue to provide a curbside woody waste collection during the months of May and November. The next curbside collection is scheduled for <u>Saturday</u>, <u>November 12</u>, <u>2022 for the entire Township</u>. <u>NOTE: This is a change from previous collections</u>. The date of the spring curbside collection will be announced after the first of the year. These collections will deal with brush and tree trimmings only.

- The trimmings must be bundled and tied with twine in 4 ft. lengths or placed in a biodegradable bag. Biodegradable bags are sold at most home improvement stores. Woody waste may be considered contaminated if it is bundled with anything other than twine or is mixed with other types of solid waste. Contaminated woody waste would then have to be considered municipal waste and would require disposal at the incinerator. This of course would defeat the benefits of recycling woody waste.
- Material should be one quarter to three inches in diameter.
- There is no limit to the number of "qualifying" bundles or bags that can be placed out for collection.
- · NO TRIMMINGS IN GARBAGE BAGS OR CANS.
- NO GRASS CLIPPINGS.
- NO TREE STUMPS.

ON-LOT DISPOSAL SYSTEM (OLDS) MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Earlier this year residents within District #2 were notified of their requirement to comply with the OLDS Management Ordinance. District #2 covers all properties served by on-lot septic systems EAST of Rt.74 (Delta Rd.) and southeast of Rt.624 (Craley Rd.). If you received a notice and have not yet taken steps to have your system pumped/inspected and if necessary, brought to full ordinance compliance, please do so prior to the end of the year.

It has been brought to our attention that pumping companies are sending out letters that do not reflect our pumping cycles. Please do not have your septic system pumped without first getting a letter from the Township, unless it is necessary to do so. If you have your septic system pumped outside of your scheduled year, you will still be required to have your septic system pumped during your normally scheduled year.

If you have questions as to whether you have complied or what year you are scheduled to have your septic system pumped, please contact the Township Office. Noncompliance will result in penalties.

ANONYMOUS COMPLAINTS

We have recently received complaints in the mail via anonymous letters. While we respect the fact that you may want to make a complaint about a neighboring property and remain anonymous, in order for the Township to address your concern we sometimes need more information than what is contained in the letter. If a letter is received that does not contain a contact name, phone number or email that we can contact you, the complaint will not be considered valid and will not be investigated.



The Township offered two (2) \$1,000 scholarships through the Windsor Township Fire & Emergency Rescue Association. To be eligible for the scholarships, the recipient has to be a member or family of a member who volunteers with one of the four (4) fire companies that serve Windsor Township.

Faith is currently attending the University of Valley Forge where she is pursuing a Bachelor's Degree in Social Work. Delinquent Sewer Bills and Water Shut Offs

Due to the number of properties in the Township that are delinquent on their quarterly sewer bills, the Board of Supervisors entered into agreements with the York Water Company and the Red Lion Municipal Authority to shut off public water to properties that are delinquent on their sewer bills. Any delinquent account that has not been paid within thirty (30) days of receiving the next quarterly bill will receive a notice that the delinquent amount is due within thirty (30) days. If the delinquent amount is not paid in full by the due date, water termination procedures will be started.

The water termination process is as follows:

- A ten (10) day notice is mailed and posted at the property requiring payment in full plus an administrative processing fee which
 is an additional \$30.00. Payment must be made at the Township Office by either cash or money order. Personal checks as well as
 online banking checks will be returned.
- Once seven (7) days have passed and payment in full plus the administrative processing fee have not been paid, a three (3) day
 notice is posted. Another \$15.00 is added to the amount owed. Again, payment must be made in full plus the administrative
 processing fees at the Township Office by either cash or money order. Personal checks as well as online banking checks will be
 returned.
- Once eight (8) days have passed and payment in full plus the administrative processing fees have not been paid, a 48-hr. notice is
 posted. Another \$15.00 is added to the amount owed. Again, payment must be made in full plus the administrative processing
 fees at the Township Office by either cash or money order. Personal checks as well as online banking checks will be returned.
- Once the ten (10) days have passed and payment in full plus the administrative processing fees have not been paid, the
 appropriate water company is contacted to shut off the water. The cost to shut off and restore water service is a total of \$30.00
 for the York Water Company and a total of \$70.00 for the Red Lion Municipal Authority. Again, payment must be made in full plus
 the appropriate shut off/restoration fee and administrative processing fees at the Township Office by either cash or money
 order. Personal checks as well as online banking checks will be returned.

We encourage the payment of the quarterly bill by the due date to ensure that there will be no interruptions of your water service.

If you mail your payment, pay at the Township Office or pay at PeoplesBank, it is important to include the bottom portion of the invoice as it contains your account number. At the least, please write your account number on your check.

Recycling Program

The restrictions on contamination placed on recycling materials exported to China continue to be in effect. The materials accepted by our recycling program have been reduced.

Only the items listed in the columns on the right are a part of the program.

Wheeled toters with lids are still available for your recycling.

The toters are 35 gallon in size and cost \$26.50. The smaller open recycling bins are still available for those who do not wish to purchase one of the wheeled toters. There is a cost of \$10.60 for the open bin. Payment needs to be in the form of cash, check or money order.

Just stop by the Township Office during normal business hours to get one. We ask that you paint your street number on the recycling container that you use. The Township will not replace lost, stolen or damaged toters or bins.

Must / Recycle?

Yes. Pennsylvania law requires all Windsor Township residential and commercial properties to recycle. All recyclable materials must be removed from the regular trash. This is not only the right thing to do environmentally, but it saves money in disposal costs.

As in the past, recycling should not be put out for collection in plastic grocery bags. It <u>will not</u> be collected.

The recycling and trash collections are provided to the residents of Windsor Township at NO CHARGE. The cost of collection is paid by Modern Landfill as a part of the Host Community Agreement.

Acceptable Items



- Aluminum food and beverage containers with food debris removed.
 Labels do not need to be removed.
- Glass food and beverage containers with <u>lids and food debris removed</u>: Clear, Brown, Green. <u>Labels do not</u> need to be removed.
- Natural and pigmented plastic narrow-neck containers with symbols 1,2,5 (milk bottles, water bottles, etc.) <u>Lids and food debris removed.</u> <u>Labels do not need to be removed.</u>
- Ferrous (Iron, steel, tin) cans with food debris removed.
- Newsprint black and white or pigmented.
- Beverage cartons (milk, orange juice, etc.)
- Corrugated cardboard cut down small enough to fit into the recycling bin.

Non-Acceptable Items



- Construction paper, craft paper, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, or similar.
- Printer paper, computer paper, copy paper
- Junk mail
- · Magazines, catalogs
- · Phone books
- Aerosol cans
- Window or auto glass, drinking glasses, mirrors
- · Light bulbs
- Microwave trays, glass cookware/ bake ware
- Plastic bags
- Styrofoam salad/deli containers
- Household items such as cooking pots, appliances and aluminum foil
- Batteries
- · Scrap metal



Electronics Recycling Collection

The Township will continue to provide an electronics event twice a year, in the spring and fall. The April event was very successful. The Township would like to thank Boy Scout Troop #155 and their leaders for their help.

The October collection date is Saturday, October 15, 2022 from 9:00 a.m. to noon at the Public Works Building located at 970 White Oak Rd. This service is available to Township residents only. Photo identification will be required. Check the Township website (www.windsortwp.com) next year for the spring date.

Materials accepted includes televisions, desktop and laptop computers, computer monitors, peripherals (mouse, keyboard, printer, etc.) as well as cell phones, vacuum cleaners, alarm clocks, irons, coffee makers or anything with a plug that does not contain Freon. Examples of items containing Freon include refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers.

If you have electronics to dispose of either before or after our event, the York County Solid Waste Authority accepts electronics free of charge to York County residents ONLY. They are located at 2651 Blackbridge Rd. (Toronita Street off Rt.30). When you arrive at their facility, go in the main entrance and proceed to the scales. You will then be directed to the small load drop-off facility. They can be reached at 717-845-1066 for their hours and what items they accept.



Drug Take Back Box

Several years ago, a Drug Take Back Box was installed in the lobby of the Township Office courtesy of the York County Regional Police Department. It is available during our normal business hours. Remove your personal information from the containers then place your unwanted or expired medications in the box to help prevent dangerous accidents with the children in your household.



Winter Tips

Below are some helpful reminders of municipal regulations and practices related to winter precipitation:

- Once a Snow Emergency has been declared, all motor vehicles MUST be removed from all Township streets to allow road crews to properly remove snow from the roads. The Snow Emergency will be announced on the local television stations as well as on our website and Facebook page.
- Snow Emergencies are typically declared when
 significant amounts of snow are being forecasted. We are
 noticing that more and more cars are being parked on the street during snow events which makes it harder for the
 trucks to plow. Based on this, a Snow Emergency may be declared more often for lesser snow storm events.
- Please do not deposit any snow onto public streets; this act is prohibited by the Snow Emergency Ordinance.
- Sidewalks must be kept clear of snow/ice within 24 hours after each storm event to provide pedestrian access regardless of whether a snow emergency has been declared.
- If you see that a neighbor hasn't removed the snow/ice from their sidewalk, check with them to see if there are health problems that have prevented the sidewalk from being cleared. If there are health problems, enlist the help of other neighbors to get the sidewalk cleared before calling the Township.
- If you go out of town during the winter months, have a plan in place with a neighbor or friend to remove the snow/ ice from your sidewalk.
- If the Township Office receives a complaint that a sidewalk is not cleared of snow/ice, the entire development is checked for compliance. The Township **does not** remove the snow/ice from the sidewalk.
- If you live near or have a fire hydrant on your property, please keep it cleared to allow emergency services to be able to quickly locate and access them in case of an emergency.
- Check your mailbox post to see if it needs to be replaced. As of August 2014, the Township will not compensate property owners should their mailbox be damaged during snow removal.

BURNING ORDINANCE

The Burning Ordinance was amended several years ago to allow for "Confined" burning within fifty feet (50') of a building. This pertains to chimineas and similar structures that are less than 55 gallon in size and have a cover to prevent fly ash. The twenty-five foot (25') setback from adjoining property lines still applies to both open and confined burns. Regardless of whether a "confined" or "open" burn is taking place, residents are required to call into York County Control (911) both prior to the burn beginning and again upon extinguishing the burn.

Lastly the Ordinance was amended so the Fire Departments have the authority to enforce the Ordinance and that both the Fire Departments and/or the Police Department have the right to extinguish any burn they feel is unsafe or in violation of the Ordinance. Spotted Lanternfly

Frequently Asked Questions



What is a spotted lanternfly (SLF) and where did it come from?

The SLF is an invasive planthopper (a type of insect) in the U.S., first found in Berks County, PA in 2014. It is native to certain parts of Southeast Asia.

How do I identify a SLF, what do I look for?

SLF go through five (5) stages of growth after hatching from eggs. The first four (4) stages are called nymphs, which are incapable of flight. The young nymphs are black with bright white spots and are roughly the size of a pencil eraser. The next stages of growth are similar but the nymphs become larger. The fourth stage of SLF, prior to adulthood, is vibrantly red with distinct patches of black and equally distinct bright white spots. The adult SLF is about 1" long. Adults have grey wings with black spots. When the SLF opens its wings, it reveals a bright red underwing. SLF live through the winter only as eggs. Adults lay eggs in masses in the late fall on trees, under bark, posts, lawn furniture, cars, trailers, outdoor grills and on many other surfaces.

Are they a threat here?

SLF feed on the sap of a plant and when there are high populations of them, they can cause significant damage. They feed on over 70+ plants, including important forestry and agricultural crops. The most damage to date has been observed in vineyards, ornamental nurseries and people's backyards.

Are SLF dangerous to pets?

SLF do not bite or sting humans or pets. No known toxins have been found in SLF to date. Pets are naturally curious and often ingest things they shouldn't, meaning there's a possibility your pet will try to taste one. The safest course of action is to keep pets away from living or dead SLF. If the pet does ingest anything outside their normal diet or is showing signs of injury or illness, consult with a veterinarian right away.

Do SLF kill trees and plants?

To date, SLF have only been seen to kill sapling trees, sumac, grapevines and tree-of-heaven. Healthy and established ornamental trees have not been recorded to have died from SLF though canopy dieback and plant health decline has been observed, particularly on some of SLF favorite spots including black walnut and maple.

Why are these so many SLF on my buildings?

In the late summer and fall, you may see adult SLF on the side of your buildings, telephone poles or other structures. This is most likely driven by SLF being attached to tall objects either to have a meal or to use as a launching post.

Do I need to scrape egg masses into a container with rubbing alcohol or can I just scrape them on the ground?

Egg masses need to be permanently submerged in rubbing alcohol to kill them. Eggs that have been scraped onto the ground can still hatch. It is important to follow all recommended steps of egg removal!

Does the SLF have natural enemies?

Some insect predators such as spiders and praying mantises have been found to attack SLF. Recently birds have also been found preying on SLF. More research is being carried out but these predators alone are unlikely to reduce or eliminate SLF from an area.

Modern Landfill Eastern Expansion

A portion of Modern Landfill on Mt. Pisgah Rd. is located within Windsor Township. There is also a portion of the landfill located in Lower Windsor Township. As a host municipality, Windsor Township has a Host Community Agreement with Republic Services which owns Modern Landfill.

Modern Landfill is proposing an eastern expansion into Lower

Windsor Township. The expansion is being proposed as there is only approximately three (3) years of storage capacity remaining at the landfill. Their first step was to negotiate a Host Community Agreement with Lower Windsor Township. After much discussion, the Lower Windsor Township Board of Supervisors decided in December of 2020 to not move forward with a Host Community Agreement.

As of the publishing of this newsletter, discussions between Lower Windsor Township and Modern Landfill have not resumed.
